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Reporting Period: 1 January – 30 June 2022

## Highlights

- Pakistan witnessed the fifth wave of COVID-19 in January which lasted till March 2022. Since June there has been a surge in COVID-19 cases hence Pakistan entered a sixth wave of COVID-19. At the beginning of the year, the number of cases were 594 and at the end of June there were 694 confirmed cases. The peak of the fifth wave saw 8,183 cases diagnosed in one day.
- Through UNICEF supported health sites 64,751 children (34,697 girls) received treatment for Severe Acute Malnutrition.
- 2,554,269 people benefitted from the continuity of primary healthcare services supported by UNICEF.
- UNICEF supported 16,542 children and parents/caregivers with access to mental health and psychosocial support.
- UNICEF faces a funding gap of US\$ 67.3 million (97 per cent) to provide critical humanitarian support.

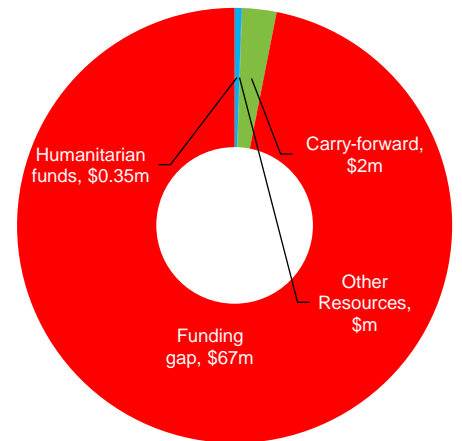

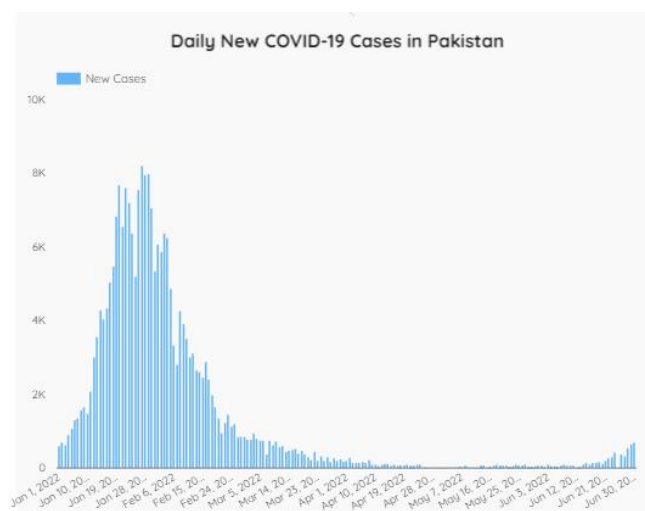
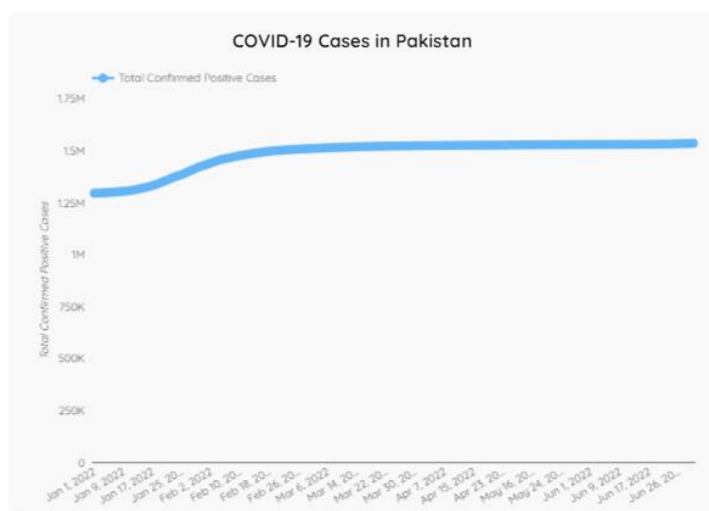
Over achievement in health is reported because UNICEF worked on system strengthening and leveraging partnership with the government health departments.

## Funding Overview and Partnerships

In 2022, UNICEF requires US\$ 69.5 million to deliver an integrated package of nutrition, health, education, WASH, and child protection services to address the needs of nearly 7.4 million people, in need, including 3.8 million children. So far, in 2022, available funds amount to only US\$ 2.15 million, resulting in a funding gap of 97 per cent. Without adequate funding, UNICEF and partners will be unable to continue supporting integrated humanitarian programmes focusing on a COVID-19 response, a nationwide chronic nutrition emergency and emergency multi-hazard emergency preparedness and response interventions across the country. Funds were received from the Government of Japan and UNICEF's Global Thematic Humanitarian funds. However, UNICEF Pakistan has a critical funding gap of US\$ 67.3 million (97 per cent) for country wide response.

## Situation Overview and Humanitarian Needs

**COVID-19 Situation:** Since the beginning of January till March/April, Pakistan went through the fifth wave of COVID-19 cases, which gradually declined (positivity reached less than 1 per cent; 208 cases on 1<sup>st</sup> April). May and most part of June continued with lower numbers reported (daily positive cases remained below 100). From mid-June the number of cases increased with positivity going up to 3.93 per cent by the end of the month (694 cases on 30<sup>th</sup> June). This is primarily due to non-adherence to COVID-19 Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs). The country is now going through the sixth wave of COVID-19 and the government has reinforced implementation of COVID-19 SOPs. 87 per cent of the target population has received the first dose of COVID-19 vaccine and 80 per cent is fully vaccinated. Booster doses are also being administered. The graphs below show the daily cases and trend of COVID-19 cases reported in the first half of the year.



**Nutrition Emergency:** Pakistan was already going through drought situation in Sindh. UNICEF is providing nutrition services through integrated services to the affected of acute watery diarrhea in Balochistan and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa.

**Acute Watery Diarrhea Situation:** Pakistan is reporting an increased number of cases of acute watery diarrhoea from all the four provinces. UNICEF is closely monitoring the situation and has prepositioned Health, WASH and Nutrition supplies in the provinces. Water testing is ongoing in hotspot districts in all four provinces.

## Summary Analysis of Programme Response

### Nutrition

UNICEF, in close collaboration with the Ministry of National Health Services Regulations and Coordination (MoNHSR&C) and respective regional health bureaus, supported the treatment of Severe Acute Malnourishment (SAM) children, with a particular focus on regions hosting a large number of Afghan Refugee population and current influx of Afghan refugees in the bordering districts. COVID-19 nutrition sector coordination continued with 19 total Nutrition Working Group (NWG) meetings held during the reporting period, eight at National level and 11 at sub-national level (Sindh 3; Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) 3; Punjab 1; and 4 in Balochistan). In terms of preparedness Nutrition maintains minimum of stock for 150,00 People in need at UNICEF warehouse however can leverage on Government partners stocks if available. Furthermore, Pakistan being well above emergency threshold of children under 5 with acute

malnutrition coupled with likelihood of floods, drought, internal displacement and poor economic situation needs at least preparedness level of 300,000 people in need.

In the first six months of the year, a total of 2,920 UNICEF-supported Outpatient Therapeutic Program (OTP) sites provided nutrition services in all the four Provinces, (Balochistan: 121; KP: 125; Punjab: 1,755 and Sindh: 919). Approximately 1,098,476 children aged 6-59 months were screened for malnutrition (548,598 boys and 549,878 girls) Similarly, a total of 64,751 children suffering from severe acute malnutrition (SAM) (30,054 boys and 34,697 girls) were admitted for SAM treatment while 133,346 children aged 6-59 months (65,407 boys 67,939 girls) received multi-micronutrient supplementation (MMS). With UNICEF's support, counselling on Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF) practices in the COVID-19 context was conducted during the reporting period and reached 29,621 pregnant and lactating women (Balochistan: 9,719 and KP: 19,902 through Lady Health Workers (LHWs) and other community-based networks. Around 91% of the children were reached through a Vitamin A Supplementation (VAS) campaign held along with the Polio National Immunization campaign which was held in May 2022.

It is also important to note that almost all districts providing services for refugees were also high burden COVID districts as well where services were provided to both refugees and host communities. Furthermore, funds in this regard are from multiple sources including RR from integrated funds, leveraging on Government resources etc.

## Health

As part of the response to the COVID-19 pandemic, UNICEF supported the continuation of essential health services, capacity building of frontline workers, provision of basic Personal Protective Equipment (PPEs) and the provision of essential supplies. In addition, UNICEF supported infection prevention control (IPC) and paediatric case management of COVID-19. UNICEF also facilitated, the introduction and scaling up of COVID-19 vaccination and strengthened the cold chain capacity in the country through the COVAX facility. From January to June 2022, UNICEF supported provincial and regional health departments to ensure continuity of essential primary healthcare services, including immunization, ante-natal care, post-natal care, service delivery, childcare, and curative care for adults, reaching 2,554,269 (1,434,097 females and 1,120,172 males) people in 136 targeted health facilities of 29 High Burden Districts (HBD). In total, 114,153 children (56,185 females and 57,968 males) were vaccinated against measles in the 136 UNICEF supported health facilities during the year.

UNICEF-supported IPC training reached 245 frontline health workers (102 women and 143 men) and Clinical Management of Children with COVID-19 training was provided to a total of five paediatricians (two women and three men). In response to increasing Acute Watery Diarrhoea (AWD) cases in Pakistan, UNICEF provided the following support; capacity building for Lady Health Supervisors on the Integrated Management of Childhood Illness (IMNCI) Guided Management of diarrhoea; distribution of Doxycycline, ORS and Zinc to target Health Facilities (HF) in Sindh (6) and Balochistan (10); initiation of procurement of supplies for Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Punjab provinces; establishment of 230 oral rehydration therapy (ORT) corners in health facilities (Sindh 6; Balochistan 74; Punjab 150); provision of masks and sanitizers in Peshawar; and the initiation of procurement of supplies for Diarrhoea Treatment Units (DTUs). A total of 17 Interagency Emergency Health Kits (IEHK) were provided for AWD response in Swat and Malakand, with 15 kits to be prepositioned in hotspot districts.

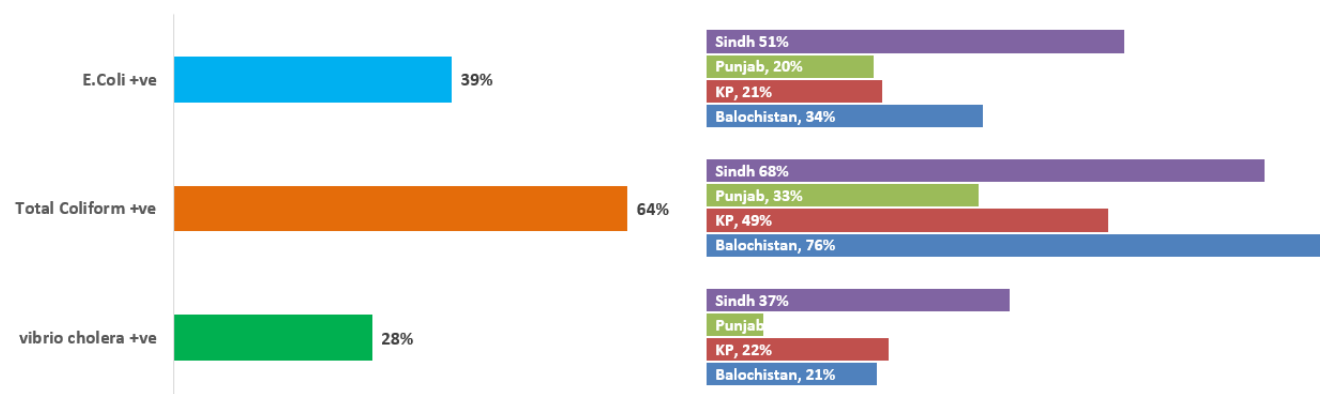
## WASH

During the reporting period, and in response to COVID-19, UNICEF convened a joint sector review meeting at the federal level with WASH partners, while the provinces held regular coordination meetings with WASH partners in collaboration with the provincial departments. Since the outbreak of AWD cases in Balochistan and Sindh, UNICEF has been coordinating closely with the WHO and government by conducting weekly meetings to ensure an effective and efficient response.

Throughout the reporting period there were ongoing regular hygiene promotion initiatives combining IPC for AWD together with COVID-19 prevention messages. The WASH sector participated in the regional training on Health Care Facility (HCF) assessments using WASHFIT – the training is planned to be cascaded to government partners in the future. UNICEF reached to over 85,000 people with hygiene promotion messages as part of the AWD response. This is

coupled with water quality testing, and chlorination to reduce the risk of infection as highlighted below:

Chlorinating an average of 82 million gallons of water every day at 10 pumping stations in Karachi serving around 7.45 millions people every day. More than 2,200 samples of water tested, 28 per cent reported to be vibrio cholera positive. However, result shows decreasing trend of positivity rate. This was possible because of awareness messages on household water treatment and handwashing with soap at critical times through more than 5,000 BCC hygiene sessions.

WASH strategically ensure any WASH related intervention in HCF should be sensitive to COVID –19 response. As such, during the reporting period UNICEF rehabilitated and installed WASH facilities, which included ultraviolet water filters, toilets, and handwashing stations in 10 health facilities (HFs) in Punjab province. During 2022, more than 22,418 people gained access to safe drinking water and sanitation facilities in these HFs. Over 180,666 people during the reporting period have been supported with hygiene promotion services including COVID-19 prevention and control information. These activities are done through the UNICEF annual program funded from other resources ensuring additional WASH IPC intervention.

### Education

To provide a better and safe learning environment for children, UNICEF along with its partners supported safe school operations and functioning in 819 formal and non-formal schools, benefiting 27,455 children (17,481 girls) during the first half of 2022.

A total of 822 teachers and education officials (484 women) were trained on safe schools reopening. In addition, 851 teachers and education officials (415 women) were also trained on Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS). To encourage learning activities of students, 10,832 parents were reached with messages on enrolment/ attendance of children through SMS and different social media platforms. In Sindh, messages related to COVID-19 vaccination and compliance of COVID-19 SOPs sent to 10,231 education managers through WhatsApp groups. Education Sector Working Group (ESWG), co-lead by UNICEF, continued to provide support to ensure continuity of learning and adherence to approved standard operating procedures (SOPs) for safe re-opening of schools. Coordination and governance structure of Education Cannot Wait (ECW) led Multi-Year Resilience Programme (MYRP) was established by ESWG. Steering Committee (SC) was formed for MYRP and its first meeting was held on 17th March 2022. Under its capacity building plan, ESWG conducted three days training on Education in Emergencies for members in June 2022 attended by 40 members, including 12 women.



Low vaccination remains a broad issue in Balochistan where only 64 per cent of education staff and 96 per cent of eligible students are vaccinated. To this end, UNICEF is conducting focused sessions on vaccine awareness in the professional development programme for teachers in Balochistan to identify issues restricting vaccination rates in schools. The challenges identified through these FGDs have been shared with stakeholders to help enhance vaccination coverage. Funding constrains has been a huge impediment for the implementation of interventions.

## **Child Protection**

In 2022, UNICEF and its partners have so far trained a total of 1,734 social workforce professionals (894 women and 840 men) in psychosocial support and stigma prevention in all the provinces. A total of 16,542 children, caregivers and other community members (2,940 girls, 2,594 boys, 5,780 women and 5,228 men) received psychosocial support from trained social workforce professionals in Punjab, KP, Sindh and Baluchistan. A total of 129,163 people were reached through messages on stigma and violence against children since the beginning of the year. A total of 655 children received child protection services through UNICEF support (149 girls and 506 boys). The low coverage is attributed to the reduction in the incidences of COVID-19, which resulted in less demand of MHPSS services from the population.

## **Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA)**

In 2022, UNICEF stepped up the implementation of measures to strengthen systems for prevention, reporting, response and accountability to survivors of sexual exploitation and abuse. UNICEF continued to implement the PSEA assessment procedure to identify and mitigate SEA risks derived from partnerships. UNICEF supported 60 partners to complete PSEA assessments and provided IPs with ongoing technical support to address gaps in their PSEA systems. Of the 60 partners, 59 now have functional PSEA systems. Currently 22 are Low Risk, 37 Moderate Risk while 1 is High Risk. The partnership with the High-Risk IP was suspended until it is proven that the IP has fully addressed all PSEA gaps. UNICEF also scaled up capacity building of partners specifically targeting the Moderate Risk and the one rated as High-Risk to ensure that they improve their PSEA systems to meet the minimum operating standards for prevention, reporting, community engagement, and accountability to survivors. A total of 55 partners designated and maintained 66 PSEA focal persons who were oriented on their role and how to receive and process allegations. The partners also deployed multiple channels such as hotlines, complaints boxes, special email address, and sharing contacts of trained PSEA Focal Points with communities to ensure safe and accessible reporting of allegations. During the period 809,900 people (300,500 women, 319,600 men, 98,910 boys, and 90,890 girls) had access to safe reporting for PSEA. UNICEF also trained 123 PSEA investigators (67 males and 56 females) from 42 partners. UNICEF also provided technical support to the inter-agency PSEA Network and collaborated with UNHCR to train 20 PSEA Focal Points from UN agencies and supported the UN PSEA Task Force to develop SOPs for the joint Community Based Complaints Mechanisms (CBCM) to ensure safe and accessible reporting of SEA allegations.

## **Social and Behaviour Change Communication, Community Engagement & Accountability**

In past months, Risk Communication and Community Engagement emergency interventions intentionally merged with long-term Social and Behaviour Change (SBC) programming. Interventions related to COVID-19 were streamlined in all program sectors, including promotion of COVID-19 preventive activities in schools, communities as well as integration in all health campaigns. Critical messages remained focused on vaccination uptake, with a special focus on promoting booster shots, increased women participation, adolescent engagement, and solidarity among the population to unite and avoid another COVID-19 wave. Over 65 million people were reached through social media platforms. Four TV/Radio campaigns were completed in five provinces, and a continuation of a partnership with faith leaders was maintained throughout this transition, including Polio social mobilization work with over 70,000 religious' leaders. All information platforms can be activated to respond in high-burden districts, as required by the government. A COVID-19 lessons-learned evaluation and assessment will be conducted, covering the response from the beginning of the pandemic.

## **Supply and Procurement Services**

Of the 124,486,420 doses of COVID-19 Vaccines allocated to Pakistan by the COVAX facility, 111,949,260 doses have been delivered to date. The Government of Pakistan has requested the delivery of 2 million doses of the Pfizer vaccine from the COVAX allocation to be delivered in August and the balance of 3,002,092 doses to be delivered in September 2022. The COVAX Facility has also allocated 64 million doses of Paediatric Pfizer vaccines to the Government of Pakistan. Sixteen million (16 million) doses will be delivered in August for paediatric vaccination campaigns in September for Sindh and Punjab provinces. UNICEF is working with Supply Division for the delivery of 16 million 0.2ml syringes by the end of August. The Government of Pakistan was also allocated 2,546,5788 doses of Oral Cholera Vaccines by the International Coordination Group. Shipments for Baluchistan (754,784 doses) and Sindh (590,878 doses) were received on the 28<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> of June and have been issued to the provinces for the implementation of Cholera Vaccination campaigns. The allocation for Lahore (1,200,916 doses) was received on the 20<sup>th</sup> of July at Federal

level. To date UNICEF has provided Procurement Services worth US\$ 125million, mostly driven by vaccine procurement. Procurement Services have also been utilized to procure RUTF for Sindh province, Hygiene material (masks, disinfectants and sanitizers) for 8,689 schools through the World Bank RREP project as well as hygiene material for the National TB Programme through the Global Fund.

## Humanitarian Leadership, Coordination and Strategy

UNICEF is co-leading three clusters and one Area of Responsibility (AoR). UNICEF co-leads both the Child Protection AoR and the Education Cluster with Save the Children, the Nutrition Cluster with Concern, Action Against Hunger (ACF) and the World Food Program (WFP) and the WASH Cluster with the Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC). Memorandums of Understanding have been signed between UNICEF and each co-Lead Agency at Country level to guide effective and efficient Coordination and ensure clear roles and responsibilities of each party. UNICEF co-led clusters and AoR are all part of the Inter-Cluster Working Group (ICWG) led by OCHA at the national and sub-national levels. UNICEF participates in the in-country interagency PSEA Task Force.

## Human Interest Stories and External Media

Pakistan was the first country to receive UNICEF Executive Director Catherine Russell, three weeks after she assumed her functions. UNICEF documented her three-day visit to Islamabad in February to support advocacy for children's rights and access to essential services, and adolescent participation, generating wide media coverage. In the first half of 2022, UNICEF continued to support MoNHSR&C to reduce COVID-19 virus transmission through adherence to SoPs for COVID-19 with a focus on wearing a mask, and through COVID-19 vaccination with a focus on women to reduce the gender gap. A series of videos, some involving celebrities and religious leaders, were published and disseminated, along social media content. During the reporting period, UNICEF also supported access to essential health services, including immunization and neonatal survival services, as well as access to adequate nutrition, WASH services, birth registration and quality education.
